Pilotage and New Lighthouse.

The necessity of having a pilot boat constantly cruising outside Race Rocks has long presented itself to commercial men in this place. Unfortunately, however, nothing has been done, save in some measure preparing the way by the introduction of a Pilot Bill into the House of Assembly. But like nearly every other piece of our colonial legislation, it must remain to wait the convenience of our legislators. In the meanwhile the reputation of the port must suffer. Every occurrence such as the grounding of the Rosedule the night before last must inevitably have an injurious effect upon the minds insurance agents at Home and in other foreign ports. If there had been a pilot boat cruising ouside, and the captain did his duty, it would be next to impossible for such an accident to take place. It needs but little consideration to show how such mistakes must militate against us as a free-port. The rates of insurance between here and England. already high enough, will be increased. This increase will have the same effect as an additional imposition of duty upon goods. It considerably higher than it ought to be; and consequently must detract from our advantage as a rival of San Francisco. This must be looked to. Nothing turtful to our com-mercial position can be tolerated. By our commerce, as much as through our gold mines, we must expect to attain to eminence and nothing can be neglected that will serve o advance the one or the other. Such a course of conduct is so transparent, that no one but a silly person would fail to observe how envy was knawing at the vitals of the trader in the board shanty. Sensible business people would very naturally treat with the contempt it deserves such jealous vaporings, or pity an otherwise respectable citizen on account of his temporary want of good sense and deficient self

What Will a Railway Cost?

We have heard in some quarters consider able doubts expressed at the possibility o constructing the Victoria and Esquimalt Rail way at much under the proposed capital o £50 000. We do not think, however, that there is much ground for fear on that score If we come to compare the cost of railroads i other parts of the world, we can easily se how a cheap road may be built with good management. Let us take the Coquimber Railway, opened this year in the Republic of Chile, as an example. This road, which with its branches is forty miles in length, was built in less than eighteen months, at a cost of £230,000, or £5,750 per mile. This includes the value of the rolling stock, purchase of land, and all legal and other expenses. All PORT-In pipes and or casks, various qualities; the railway iron, rolling stock, and machinery, had to be brought from England around Cape Horn, while the timber and sleepers had to be brought by sea, partly from southern Chile and partly from California. There is no reason why our road should not be built for very nearly the same price per mile. All the timber required for sleepers may be had close at the difference in the cost of freight from England to the two places cannot be so very great on the material for a short road, while the engineering difficulties cannot be near so great here as in a hilly country like Chile. This would go far to counterbalance that trade. Had it been done long ago we any inequality in the price of the land of the respective roads. If then our three miles of the road can be built for anything near the the Nannette, off Race Rocks, and now the same price, the profits sure to be realized will be a strong inducement to extend the railway system in the Colony, and for the investment of English capital.

Exploration of Lieut Hankin and Dr Wood, of H.M. S. Hecate, from Kyuquot Inlet, on the West Coast, to Nimkish River, Fort Rupert.

We adverted last summer to an exploring narty sent from H. M. S. Hecate, across this sland from Kyuquot Inlet to Fort Rupert. We have it now in our power to lay before our readers the report of the explorers, Lieut. Hankin and Dr. Wood. It cannot but prove very interesting to all who take an interest is the progress of the colony, and are desirous of seeing it thoroughly explored and its resources made public. The expedition was projected by Capt. Richards, of the Hecate, as the following letter to His Excellency Gov. Douglas, enclosing copies of the reports of Lieut. Hankin and Dr. Wood, fully ex-

And I should not be doing justice to the efforts of the officers employed on such service were I not to say that I have always found them ready and anxious to carry out

It may not be out of place to inform your Excellency that the survey of the greater part of the Western Coast has been completed and several new harbors and anchorages discovered, which, when published for general information, will, I think, prevent a recurrence or lessen the frequency of disasters which have annually belatlen vessels navigating in this hoisterous neighborhood. this boisterous neighborhood.

Copy of Lieut. Hankin's Report to Capt.
Richards of a Journey Across Vancouver Island. H M. Surveying Ship Hecate.

NANAIMO, June 17th.

Sir-In obedience to your instructions to endeavor to cross the Island from the head of the Kayuket Inlet, on the western coast, to the Nimkish Liver on the eastern coast, with a view of making some exploration of the interior of the country, I have the honor to inform you that accompanied by Dr. Wood, I left the ship on the 25th of last month, at Queen's Cove, Esperanza Inlet, in canoe with four Indians for Kayuket, where I trusted we should obtain a snflicient number of men to carry our provisions, instruments etc.

KAYUKET INDIANS. We arrived at Kayuket Island the following day at noon, where I found a very large Indian settlement, called by the natives "Actiss". There are between 700 and 800 people living here, and they are a finer looks quite a young man, apparently not more han 22 or 23 years of age; his name is Kaiand carry our traps out of the canoe. I had afterwards occasion to remain with these people several days, and although they bad them had visited Victoria, and had returned with such wonderful accounts, that others were eager to go, and their anxiety to see the Hecate was intense. I feund my knowledge of the Barelay Sound language most useful to me, in fact, without it, we should totally ignorant of Chinook Kryuket language differs from that spo-ken at O-hi at (Barclay Sound), principally in the expressions, very many of the worlds being similar. I cannot but consider the latter language to be the most useful one spoken on the west coast, for with a competent knowl-

edge of it one may be understood from Niti-nat to Port Brookes. STARTING OVERLAND. Having explained to the natives the object of my visit, and told them of my anxiety to start as soon as possible, and of my wish to obtain 8 or 10 Indians to accompany me, I succeeded, after some trouble, in securing the services of seven, who promised to start early on the morrow for the payment of three blan-kets and a shirt each? I was up at daylight the following morning, and having packed everything as snngly as possible—for I fore-saw that seven Indians would have almost saw that seven Indians would have almost more than they could carry with our blankets, pravisions, instruments, and collecting material of Dr. Wood's (in addition to baskets of dried halibut for their own use), I commenced to get my men Cather, which, after no little difficulty, I succeeded in doing, for they could not see, with me, the necessity for suc an early start, and as yet were scarcely awake. However, after a couple of hours I had them all collected on the beach with their canoe, ready for a start to the Tarshish River, some 14 miles up the Kayuket Arm from whence the trail commences. By 8 from whence the trail commences. By 8 a. m., we were fairly on our way, and after six hours paddling arrived at the Tarshish River, where we camped for the night. I saw here the remains of a considerable Indian village, which is inhabited during the salmon season by the Kayuket Indians, who all report this as being an extremely good fishing ground. The following day (28th) was unfortunately wet, but I could not afford to remain the whole day at Tarshish, so we quickly packed up, and made the best of our way in the canoe; but we had scarcely ascended the river a mile when both rain and wind beat heavily in our faces, and we found it extremely difficult to make any progress. the streemely difficult to make any progress.

The Indians now began to object to proceeding, so I was reluctantly obliged to camp for the day, which I did on the west bank of the river.

The Tarshish River has an average width of not more than 40 yards, and is very rapid, being only navigable for cances about 4 miles.

The next day, to my disappointment, it was still raining, and the river being much swollen, the Indians began to dislike the state of affairs, and talked about returning to Actiss. I think they were intimidated by the rapid rise of the river, and they said it was much to swift and deep to attempt a crossing with any degree of safety; and in the afternoon, to my regret, they told me they had made up their minds to return; so shortly afterwards all our traps were in the The Tarshish River has an average width of shortly afterwards all our traps were in the cince, and we were on our way back to Knytket, where we arrived early the following day. We were received by the natives, as before, with every kindness; and pitching our little tent, took up our old quarter. shortly afterwards all our traps were in the euroe, and we were on our way back to

I now feared that the whole expedition would entirely fail; and it was my in ention to remain at Kayuket until the arrival of the ship, which was expected in a few days.

INDIAN GAMES.

During my stay here, my time was principally occupied in improving my knowledge of the language and adding considerably to my already extensive vocabulary. In the evening I would get up games among the language interior works for the language interior works. evening I would get up games atmong the Indians, leaping, jumping, racing, &c., by which they appeared to be much amused. They also had one or two games of their own which they showed us. one of which, a trial of strength, appeared to be a special favorite. Fifty or sixty of them, with naked bodies and faces daubed with red and black paint, would seize a long pole, using it as a battering ram. demons than men, would charge against some demons than men, would charge against some bundred and fifty others, who with their united strength would exdeavor to route the invaders. As o her more quiet one was stieting a feather in the ground, when an Indian standing on one foot would stoop down and, without touching the ground with his hand, extract the feather with his teeth. This feat I tried several times and generally tumbled, when a heart large was raised at my extract the feather with his teeth. when a hearty laugh was raised at my expense. During the day an intelligent Indian would draw for me on the sand the trail across would draw for me on the sand the trail across the Island to Nimkish, putting in the lakes and rivers, and telling us their native names. Several would volunteer their services for this office, and it was amusing to see their disputes about the differences of the distances than their product.

On the third day of our stay here, it struck me that it would still be possible to cross the Island in time to meet the ship at Fort Rupert by the 15th, according to my instructions, if I could but get Indians to accom-

PACKING ACROSS. It was a beautiful, clear morning, and with a fresh breeze from the S. W., we rapidly arrived at Tarshish, and by 5 o'clock the same evening, camped some four miles up the river on the north bank. Here the Indians hid their canoe in the brish, being unable to proceed further by water on account of rapids and falls. We had some difficulty in proceeding even this fir by canoe, and in one place had to make a portage of about 200 yards.
